## Kewstoke Parish Council Survey Results 2022



Back in 2002 Kewstoke Parish Council with funding from the **Countryside Agency** produced a questionnaire that was delivered to every house in the Parish of Kewstoke. The questions covered all aspects of Village life. The Survey was completed by over 400 households and the resulting information has been used by local organisations and the Parish Council when faced with making decisions on planning, transport, providing local amenities and as a tool when dealing with the local authorities and other organisations.

Now 20 years later in 2022 the Parish Council felt that it was time to do the survey again to make it a more up to date and valid tool for the coming years. The questions covered: The Village Hall, The Parish Council, St Pauls Church, Local shops & businesses, Tourism, Transport, Highways & Parking, Street lighting, Land Use & Planning, Young people and Climate change. Along with a wish list. This time use of the internet to create the survey, send out and collect the results, has made the process a lot easier to do.

The responses to the questions were converted into graph format and comments made by residents where they thought appropriate. Many of the topics have suggested action plans to follow up by the various organisations who asked to have the questions included in the survey.

The sections School &

Church were asked by both of these organisations. The results have been given to both parties and this will help them with their planning. The Parish Council will use the responses to the questions that they posed going forward, when dealing with the relevant authorities and to help make decisions affecting residents & visitors.

We had a total of 578 people went into the survey online. Paper copies were made available to residents without internet access. These were distributed & collected by volunteers and the data input into the survey. Of the 578 people going into the survey 163 people partially completed the survey. Of these only 28 people completed more than 50% of the questions. These have been not included in the final results.

## **Phone Box Defibrillator**

Thank you to all that took the time to complete the survey on behalf of the Parish Council and the organisations posing the questions. We would also like to thank the volunteers who gave up their time to distribute and collect paper copies to those without internet access and those who studied the data in order for us to complete the survey.

You may have noticed that the telephone box on the Junction of Kewstoke Road And Crookes Lane has had a makeover recently.

Councillors Tony Morris and Glen Verncombe have painted it inside and out and have replaced the missing panes of glass in preparation for the arrival of a new defibrillator purchased by the Parish Council.

The Parish Council bought the phone box from BT for the princely sum of £1.00, however it was necessary to have a new electricity supply & meter that complied with all current regulations. This cost a further £2300.00.

This now gives us two parish Council owned defibrillators in the Village. One on the wall of the Village Hall and now this one. There are others in the village: Pontins and the Entrance to Ardnave Park come to mind.

How to access and use the defibrillators: The two Parish Council owned defibrillators are in locked cases to avoid theft. Both of these are logged with the South West Ambulance Service. In the event of a 999 call being made where a defibrillator is thought to be required, the caller will be given the code of the nearest defibrillator. The individual machines have a talk through procedure for the user.

It is the Parish Council's intention to install a further defibrillator to accommodate those Page 5

living in Beach Road/ Sand Road. We have identified a possible site on the Toilet/kiosk in the Bus terminus car park. We have the lease on the building, so it looks to be an ideal spot. It is hoped that funding can be precepted for in next years budget.

The Phone box does lend itself to other uses as well as housing the defibrillator. There may be space for a small set of shelves. This could be used for a book swap, plant swop.

I love this time of year Christmas lights appear everywhere you look darkness, especially draw in so quickly and the mornings are so dark.


However, I am acutely aware that the lights do not bring comfort to everyone, and that is

Kewstoke and Wick St Lawrence Churches warmly welcome you to join with us this Christmas to celebrate and rediscover the blessings of that first Christmas.

We wish you a very happy and blessed Christmas.

Question: could we hold a mini-Glastonbury style event in Kewstoke? Loads of different activities over 4 days? Something for everyone?

The original document is dated 29th June 2021 (and surprisingly it is not too far from the end result!) was presented to the Community Group – who bizarrely, and perhaps some will now say stupidly, thought it might work. And all of this on the back of our planning for our biggest project to date - a one-night hog roast for 120 people. In hindsight it was madness.

A successful hog roast blind confidence, and so we took our idea to the Parish Council. We knew that key resources would get sold really quickly so needed backing to get this off the ground. We presented on or around 12th October. God knows how or why.

But the PC bought the idea. And agreed to fund the hire of a large marquee. This point needs recognising, because had the PC done the sensible thing and sent us home with our tails between our legs, we would have seen a hog roast and street party over the Jubilee weekend and nothing more. Let that sink in. This would not have happened without the active support of **Kewstoke Parish** Council.

We booked the marquee the following day – and by being a cash buyer were able to nick a marquee that another community had



tentatively booked, but not secured. Now the really difficult bit. Getting an agreed timetable and securing what we need to support it. The timetable changed shape significantly over the next couple of months, but we did recognise the central parts which we could not do ourselves and focussed on securing





the necessary infrastructure and musical acts. Members of the team had "contacts"! So, Reoffender, Sunday Affair, Dennis DeMille and The Kingsnakes were booked alongside a Race Night. The provision of food stalls, portaloos, generator, security, PA / sound, waste management and insurance were arranged. All on tick at this stage. The Village Hall committee offered the use their facilities for the four days at no cost. Yet another significant village contribution. We recognised that we

were not able to provide bar facilities on this scale and The Chip Shop stepped up to take this on as well as providing a wine and gin bar (my favourite over the weekend!) and snacks. It all started to take shape. Next was advertising. We had Facebook (and used it extensively) but recognised that not everyone used FB, so we made arrangements for posters and 2 leaflet drops with the team and Parish Councillors delivering to every household in the village. All of this needed cash. We approached a number of local

businesses and were gobsmacked by the result. We managed to get enough funding to continue. And then the icing on the financial cake. A half-hearted, speculative application for National Lottery funding resulted in a significant donation and we were now rolling. Detailed day-to-day planning and resourcing sessions continued. Local wellbeing practitioners agreed to support us for morning sessions. A logistical plan was developed for both the dog-walk and the horse parade. The latter involved





marshalling of traffic around the village and so was extremely complex – it was still being tweaked and amended on the day before the event itself. In depth (and I mean in depth!) planning was undertaken for the Sports Day, Horse



Parade, Dog Walk, Village Fete, Jumble Sale, Bake Off and Arts & Crafts activities.

Teams are being rounded up for the Tug of War. Plans and requirements for sound are changed and changed again.

We're in April – just 2 months from go live and we are finding ourselves busy with details. Stuff to arrange. Stuff to buy. Schedules to devise. The team are in overdrive and we are in danger of failure by simply not being able to cover the ground. A major practical consideration was always car-parking. If we are providing events for up to 400 people and we work on 2 people per car, that's 200 cars, right? How do we park 200 cars in Kewstoke? We approached local car park and landowners who gave us access to some overflow facilities, but would it be enough?

Logistical plans were considered, discounted, amended and revisited and a general approach was agreed, but it would take some very careful management to enact. Tickets for the Thursday and Saturday night music events are printed







and made available for sale from The Pink Shop, The New Inn and The Chip Shop..

We planned for a capacity of 180 for the Thursday night (so that we could hold the Rock & Roll band in the hall) and 400 in the marquee for the Saturday night, but by mid-May it looks like we'd be lucky if we got many more than half of those amounts.

As we approach June it is recognised that there is no way the team can on their own support and manage activities that span a 16-hour day over 4 days. Let alone think about set-up and take-down of infrastructure.

A number of activity leads collar family members and friends to help out with both planning and delivery. In addition, the net is cast and local helpers are sought with a volunteers





meeting being held mid-May resulting in a further 12 helpers being engaged, alongside 3 of the Village Hall staff bringing the total supporting team to about 30 in total.

In addition, the Scouts offer to help out over the weekend and to camp over Wednesday to Friday night to look after on-site equipment.

We were able to secure the services of local 80's band High Impact and so maintained our schedule.

Reoffender (our

headline act for the Saturday night) were brilliant.

We're in the final week and suddenly Thursday and Saturday night tickets become like golddust and start flying out of the door. We moved from a projection of about 50% capacity to one of a sell-out in a matter of 2 days. The final batch of tickets were released and were sold within days. Tickets for Thursday Afternoon Teas are issued and are snapped up.

As we moved into Jubilee week itself all tickets are sold and all that's left is to deliver the plan. The last few days before the Jubilee and we're into nail-biting time.

We've now made all payments for equipment – but would it arrive? Would the marquee actually be delivered? Would the portaloos and waste bins and Saturday night Security team turn up? Would any of our attractions become unavailable or would any of our entertainers pull out at the last minute? Were our plans robust? What had we missed? And – really importantly - what would the weather do?





The forecast a couple of weeks before the Jubilee had been really good, but as we got closer forecasts got much more mixed, with some suggesting we could see some very heavy rain at times over the weekend. Our fingers were very much crossed.

In the afternoon of Tuesday 31st May the first piece of infrastructure arrives – the portaloos! We're now officially up and running.

Wednesday 1st June arrives. It's a bright and warm day and right on

time the marguee arrives and by early afternoon is fully erected. The generator that will be needed to power the food outlets. bar and inflatables is collected and delivered to site. The stage is delivered and installed while off-site the Bake-Off team are feverishly preparing Afternoon Teas for the Thursday afternoon. The bar, refrigerated storage van and beer stocks are delivered

Come Wednesday evening, all is peaceful and the Scouts are on site for their first night's camp.

Thursday 2nd June. We



wake up to beautiful blue skies and sunshine. And the day got off to a great start with a yoga session being held on the playing field.

At 11am, our royally attired dogs congregated by the Chip Shop before a communal walk on the beach. Upon return there were puppachinos for all! The winner of the fancy-dress competition was Hugo aka Simba The Lion King! As we enter the afternoon, there's final preparations in the marquee for the Arts & Crafts and Bake Off events, while the Horse Parade weaves it's way through the village. Marshalls are placed at strategic points to temporarily stop traffic so that everyone stays safe.

The Horse Parade arrives at the village hall and both the Arts & Crafts and Bake Off are now in full swing. As the afternoon ends, the Arts & Crafts and Bake Off concludes and we transition and get





ready for the Thursday night musical entertainment! Both the main bar and prosecco bar are up and running.

And first up on Thursday evening we have a disco! And then Dennis De Mille of Britain's Got Talent fame bringing his very own style of Swing, Soul and Jazz with a smattering of Rock & Roll!

We then move from the marquee into the Village Hall for local Rock & Roll band The Kingsnakes.The evening ends. And what a successful first day we've had!

Friday morning arrives and again the morning is set fair. Everyone is checking the weather apps on their phones as the forecast says rain at some time during the day – but when? The morning yoga session though is still able to be held on the



field.get the inflatables up in preparation for the afternoon Sports Day. Our volunteers receive a full safety briefing and, once everything is ready, the Scouts have a real good time testing out the equipment!

Come Friday afternoon we are in full sunshine. Kewstoke sees a Family Day like it hasn't seen more many a year. The field is packed.

The younger village residents take part in races, a penalty shootout and the assault course challenge and are helped out by those of greater years in a game of family rounders.

The Friday sees the return of the highly competitive Kewstoke Tug of War competition, eventually won by the New Inn team.

As the afternoon activities end, we make ready for the Friday night. And it starts to rain! There's frantic movement of tables and chairs back inside the tent and the outside food and prosecco bars are relocated to be under cover as well.

The Friday night Race night is really well supported and the investment in the

marquee pays off as it rains persistently and heavily outside, but we all stay dry under the canvas.

It's the end of Day 2 and all has gone as well as it possibly could have done. We now start to prepare for the weekend.

We get to Saturday morning and the day starts grey and drizzly. The morning's Fit-Steps takes place in the hall and we are all praying that we get the forecast of improved weather late morning and early afternoon.

And so it is! Come about midday the sun breaks through as we prepare for the jumble sale and annual village fete.

Though this turns out to be one with a difference – the car park and overflow car park are full! We've never had so many people at a fete before – and again the marquee proved invaluable as we were able to house all stall holders in one place.

We now move on to our headline event, the sold -out Saturday night concert. Our Caribbean food vendor had been in the village preparing food during the afternoon and then, as she was making final preparations, sent out for more produce so that they can cater for more customers.

We have a team on the car park gates ready for the deluge of cars we were expecting. Plans were in place for the use of overflow facilities and the team on the evening come up with a streamlined process to handle tickets on the door. Our Security team arrive and we are as ready as ready can be. But where are the cars?

We have a steady stream of ticketholders, but the message of arrive by foot seems to have got out and we end up with a half empty car park.

After an hour's disco, first on stage are 80's band High Impact. The crowd enjoyed watching and dancing both inside and outside under some lovely evening sunshine. And then our headliners, Reoffender,





who play a raucous set to a hugely appreciative crowd. Kewstoke definitely rocked on the Saturday night!!

For those wanting some post-gig late night drinks, all roads led back to the New Inn which was heaving! And the partying (apparently!) went on until the early hours of the morning.

Sunday morning. Our last day. And the day started with a few showers and feeling a little cooler than the previous few days. But the marquee again does its job as the village congregates for a service on the field. Unfortunately, Reverend Gail was unwell and so the service was held by pastors. In the afternoon, the grey clouds gathered and the village picnic was held under the marquee. We were entertained by Des Henley's Strummers and Ken Lintern.

This was a lovely relaxing way to conclude the weekend's Jubilee celebrations. And then we were done.



### The Grumpy Farmer

Hello again from me The Grumpy old Farmer.

I'll try not to be too grumpy as there is so much bad news at the moment: The war in Ukraine and predictions about climate change etc. The war in Ukraine has had a big impact in the cost of living, the cost of energy and food. Red Diesel almost doubled in price to around £1.20 a litre and cattle feed also up by a third at least.

My life here on the farm is very busy with farming and helping to convert an old stone barn to let out.

The government has been encouraging farmers to diversify and to support the viability of the farm. Another attempt at diversifying has been cider making. Caroline, one of my daughters has a small cider press and was keen to help.

We began collecting apples from our own small orchard and some from Home Farm and other places that were offering them free. The job was then to make them into a pulp by putting them through a pulper. It helps squeeze all of the juice out. We put the pulp through the press and were able to make somewhere around 30 gallons.

This all happened last autumn and we are now sampling our attempts. It has an acquired taste, quite dry but it's OK with a splash of lemonade. We haven't sold any yet as we are drinking it ourselves. The long hot summer seems a distant memory now.

It made haymaking easy. We could cut one day and almost bale the next, which is unbelievably quick. But being so dry, the grass didn't grow back after, so I ended up having to feed some of the hay to the animals long before winter, so I'm hoping I'll have enough to last through the winter to next spring.

Did anyone notice how early the swallows left this year? It was still warm with plenty of flies around, but still they went. I wonder if anyone out there knows why?

I did learn something the other day when walking along Elmsley Lane just after Kewstoke rhyne has been keetched. I came across a pike, quite a

size, still gasping for breath. I thought that I should take him home for tea but I took pity on him and put him back into the water. He quickly swam away. One lucky pike. After talking to the drainage foreman, they had thrown 8 to 10 back in one day along with eels and a roach on a previous occasion.

One of the ponds on the farm dried out during the hot summer.

It's now been desilted and will be a nice pond for ducks, moorhens and other wildlife when the winter rains fill it back up. I remember catching eels there when I was a young boy. I would take them home to cook for my grandfather's supper.

A young chap has started a nature reserve not far away and has a lovely photo of a barn owl in flight taken locally. So seems like a lot of wildlife around. All good signs.

A number of the cows didn't calve this spring and I think that Loxton Commander has lost his interest in sex, so I'm afraid he had to go. Ended up down the local pie shop I think.

Then the hunt was on for a new bull at the right price. Decided on another Simental and found one from a farm in Wiltshire by the pedigree name of Huntingford Lord 20.

Look on the internet and you can see his father. He is only a young bull, so hope he managed to serve all his ladies. I will update you next year.

#### **Community Speed Watch System**

#### Community Speed Watch System

Back in November 2021 after a request from concerned residents living on Kewstoke Road about the speed of drivers using Kewstoke Road, the Parish Council commissioned 3 speed surveys to run concurrently for 7 days, 24 hours a day.

This monitored not only the speed of the vehicles travelling both ways and the type of vehicle. The strips in the road can differentiate between a car, lorry or van.

The results from the three surveys showed that in general the majority of the traffic using the road was within the acceptable parameters of both the 20mph & 30mph limits applied by North Somerset Council Highways. There were those that did travel too fast, but these were isolated enough that the North Somerset Council Highways team didn't feel that any action should be taken in the form of traffic calming.

Their point was also that there were very few accidents reported and that their priority was to areas where there were accident black spots.

It was suggested that Parish Council with the help of the Police could set up a Speed watch system. This was offered to the residents who at the time did not want to take this on.

Fast forward now to 2022. There have been more and more reports of speeding vehicles, not just on Kewstoke Road but throughout the village. At a recent Parish Council meeting Police Inspector from Avon & Somerset Police was invited along to answer councillor's questions as to why we not getting the monthly crime statistics as we used to and on the occasions that we did receive them, they were so vague as to be of little use to inform residents. This along with why representation from a PCSO each month had also stopped happening.

The Parish Council have now been promised that we will have more detailed crime figures and regular representation at monthly meetings by a PCSO.

The topic then moved onto speeding motorists. In response to a member of the public's reference to speeding issues on Kewstoke Road. it was agreed that Speed Control Vans would be, subject to an initial survey, deployed at strategic points along Kewstoke Road. In addition, he agreed to help set up a **Community Speed** Watch group if local volunteers and a coordinator could be found.

We do have a couple of interested residents at the moment. In order for this to happen we really need to have a response from anyone that would be interested in getting involved with this.

SpeedWatch is a partnership between the Community, the Police and Local Authorities. It gives local people the ability to actively get involved in road safety. How does SpeedWatch work?

A Community SpeedWatch can be set up in any village, small town, or urban area, governed by either a 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour speed limit. A team of local residents who are willing to volunteer a small amount of time each week are trained and issued with speed detection equipment to monitor speeds. Vehicles observed speeding will be sent a warning letter along with advice to help change their driving behaviour. Further action will be taken by the police against persistent and high end speed offenders as well as targeting individual locations. https:// www.avonandsomerse t.police.uk/apply/ communityspeedwatch/

# Recipe

# **CHUNKY CURRANT SHORTBREADS**



#### MAKES APPROX 8 GIANT COOKIES

#### Ingredients

100g golden caster				
sugar plus extra for				
dusting				

220g unsalted butter or stork chilled and cubed

200g plain flour plus extra for rolling

120g ground almonds

2 tsp mixed spice

60g currants

- Whiz the butter, sugar, flour, ground almonds and spice in a food processor until the crumbs start to cling together or with your hand mixer.
- 2. Transfer the mixture to a large bowl, work in the currants and bring the dough together. You can use either the dough straight away or wrap in clingfilm and chill until required. Preheat the oven to 160/140 fan/gas 2half.
- 3. On a lightly floured surface roll the

dough to about 1cm thick then use a 9cm fluted cutter to make about 8 biscuits or you can make them as small as you wish.

- 4.Arrange these on one or two nonstick baking sheets spaced slightly apart, then cook for 50 minutes or until lightly coloured.
- Dust with caster sugar, then loosen with a spatula before leaving them to cool. They will keep well for up to a week in an airtight container.

You won't stop eating just one....it will be followed by another!
